For example, optical fibers and cables are generally classified under HS Code 8544.70, which includes insulated electric conductors where optical fibers transmit light signals for communication. Products from certain countries, like Cuba and North Korea, face significantly higher rates, while those from China are subject to additional duties due to tariffs .
