

Article Overview

Install a Type 2 SPD in your distribution box with proper overcurrent protection and short, direct wiring to safeguard your electrical system from surges.

Choosing the Right SPD

- o Type 1 SPD: Installed at the service entrance to protect against direct lightning strikes.
- o Type 2 SPD: Installed at the distribution board or consumer unit; standard for most homes and offices ().
- o Type 3 SPD: Installed near sensitive devices like computers or servers for additional protection (). For a typical distribution box, a Type 2 SPD is recommended to handle switching surges and indirect lightning effects ().

Placement and Wiring

- o Install the SPD after the main breaker in the distribution board ().
- o Keep wiring short and direct, ideally less than 0.5 meters and never exceeding 1 meter in total length ().
- o Use DIN rail or wall-mounted locations inside the distribution box for secure installation ().
- o Ensure the SPD is connected to a reliable earth/ground to safely divert surge currents ().

Overcurrent Protection

- o SPDs must be protected against overcurrent using an MCB or in-built fuse as specified by the manufacturer ().
- o The overcurrent device should not be the main DNO fuse, to avoid disconnecting the entire supply if the SPD fails ().
- o This protection also provides a point of isolation for maintenance or testing.

Safety Precautions

- o Switch off the main breaker and verify with a voltage tester that all conductors are de-energized ().
- o Apply Lockout/Tagout (LOTO) procedures to prevent accidental re-energization ().
- o Wear PPE such as insulated gloves, protective glasses, and safety shoes ().

Additional Considerations

- o Ensure the SPD meets relevant standards like UL 1449, UL 508A, or IEC 61643 ().
- o For sensitive equipment, consider Type 3 SPDs near devices for extra protection ().
